#### From the Rector-- A Thorough Check-Up

In the March and April newsletters I wrote to you about a process of "remembering the future"; as your Vestry considered the state of our facilities and demographic trends in our community and denomination. An important diagnostic component of this work will take place in the first half of August. Experts from the firm Building Solutions will conduct a two-day visit to assess the conditions of our leasehold and buildings, including roofs, exterior walls, HVAC, plumbing, electric, safety, and more. Our Buildings and Grounds Committee considered two facilities assessment firms, as well as the possibility of assembling these inspections locally. At the end of the day the committee valued the objectivity such an outside company would bring, and took into account the strong recommendations Building Solutions had from St. Andrews-Sewanee School and Annette Smith (who worked with them on 3 school assessments).

Before arriving onsite, Building Solutions (whose initials I won't refer to them by!) will review and analyze extensive documentation about our property compiled by Parish Administrator Dan Amundson.



This bit of siding that fell off the front of Claiborne is pretty obvious, but we'd also like to know about little problems or less conspicuous issues that you know of around the church campus.

They will report their first impressions from the inspection at the end of their site visit, and we will share these preliminary findings as a part of the all-parish brunch at 9:45am on Sunday, August 18. Building Solutions will then further analyze the data they have gathered in light of their knowledge base about the life cycle of various building systems.

The final report from Building Solutions is expected in September. It will include a detailed description of the various aspects of our facilities and their current condition, as well as a spreadsheet predicting when items will need to be replaced and at what cost in that year. This will give us more comprehensive and precise information than has been available before about what is (and will be) needed to keep our beautiful facilities in good repair for years to come. The framework the report will provide will allow current and future Vestries and Junior Wardens to plan major repairs and replacements in advance so as to save money over the long run.

As mentioned earlier this year, a Capital Campaign Exploratory Steering Committee chaired by Jay Fisher has been authorized to undertake a feasibility study to help the Vestry discern whether a campaign will be appropriate in our near future. Jay will provide a preview of that process at our parish wide brunch on Aug 18. The final report from Building Solutions will provide important information as this discernment enters a new phase this November. Congregational conversations and a survey will listen to the voices from the pews to gain a sense of parishioners' viewpoints informed by what we have learned. Please pray for your Vestry and the others involved in this significant work.

The Rev. Rob Lamborn began vacation on Monday, July 15, and will be back in the office Wednesday, July 31. The parish office remains open and staffed regular hours. #### Rite 13 resumes this fall (date TBD)

Rite 13's 2023-2024 academic year concluded with a year-end party at Lake Cheston. The program will begin again just before or after Labor Day.

Rite 13 is the first module of Journey to Adulthood (J2A). J2A is centered on inclusive, relational ministry and uses Bible study, prayer, rites of passage, and service projects. # **Children's Formation**

A Godly Play session for all ages – Sunday, July 28, 11:15 a.m. in Godly Play 2

Come hear a story and reflect on it with us. Learn what we do in Godly Play, and why we do it.

This is for anyone who would like an introduction, orientation, refresher, or some inspiration as we head into the new school year.



#### Godly Play resumes August 4th

Godly Play is not merely a curriculum. It is a deep, reflective spiritual practice. Godly Play storytellers find new treasure in the stories, even after hearing and telling them many times. Children learn new ways of seeing the world with this practice, which is not didactive theology but an exploration of relationship with God through storytelling.

We have two Godly Play classrooms. Godly Play 1 is designed for children 3-5 years old.

These youngsters will hear the core stories, often tied to the lectionary. In this classroom, children learn how to form and hold the circle. They learn to take turns, hold space, and engage in classroom conversation. They also learn positive habits like doing one thing at a time, cleaning up they go, and serving others before themselves. Modeled after Holy Eucharist, the schedule includes time for prayer, the word, reflection, thanksgiving, and a shared feast. In Godly Play 2, these practices are reinforced and deepened. Consideration of the stories is expanded with enrichment stories and side-by-side storytelling. Our wonderful crew of storytellers and doorkeepers are excited to greet new children and returning students alike!

Centering Prayer is a method of silent prayer through which we consent to God's presence and action within us. Those who practice it do so not in place of corporate worship and service, but rather as a necessary complement to those modes of engaging with God and with our neighbor. Having a core of people in the parish who practice contemplative prayer makes a difference.

The Centering Prayer support group at St. Mark and St. Paul's continues to meet faithfully every Monday night. With chairs encircling a candle at the front of the nave, we have a brief check-in about our prayer practice and anything else going on in our lives, and then we have a meditation session (what we call a "sit") together. #### **Education for Ministry (Summer 2024)**

EfM is a FOUR year seminar with all class year participants meeting in ONE seminar group. Year 1 studies the Hebrew Bible, Year 2 studies the New Testament, Year 3 studies the History of Christianity, and Year 4 studies contemporary theology of the Episcopal tradition. Seminar participants from all four years reflect upon various concerns from their readings, the relationship of those themes between each of the four years, and the implications of the theme in today's world. Reflection on these themes is guided by utilizing four different perspectives from experience, society (culture), tradition (Episcopal Church), and personal beliefs. The goal of EfM is to deepen faith and to discover expressions of that faith in service to others.

The 2024-2025 sessions will begin after Labor Day 2024 and will end before Memorial Day 2025. Exact dates will be determined after the initial registration is completed.

The Sewanee EfM seminar group meets on Monday nights from 6:30 until 9:00 in the Hethcock Room at Saint Mark and Saint Paul.


COMMUNITY ACTION COMMITTEE

#### A Note from your Altar Guild

We wish to extend a warm welcome to our new parish members and a continued "thank you" to those who have been around a while.

The Altar Guild ministry is open to everyone – including men, as you may have noticed in the weekly bulletin listing those serving each Sunday.

Some families like to get involved and that is certainly encouraged. We like to utilize everyone's particular skills. Some like to polish brass/silver while some like to wash linens for the Eucharist. I personally like the satisfaction of seeing the altar setup for the service – everything in its place and ready for the ministers to use during the service.

Like everything else, altar guild service is not for everyone. We welcome you to try it out for a month or two to see if it is as fulfilling for you as it is for those of us currently serving. We promise we will be there to walk you through everything and we utilize checklists, post photographs or diagrams of altar setups and provide manuals to help us all remember what to do.

What type of time commitment is involved? For our regular services we schedule 2 members a Sunday. They usually meet on Sat. morning to polish and get the vessels setup for Sunday. On Sunday morning, one person comes prior to the 8:30am service (around 8:00am) and sets out the prepared items. After that service both members clean what was used and resets for the 11:00am service. After that service the second member cleans and puts everything away. Of course there are special services such as funerals or seasonal services where we all pitch in according to our availability.
