From the Rector--Remembering the Future

Our parish is blessed with wonderful facilities that support a wide range of ministries and community activities! On our 3 1/2-acre leasehold sit a historic church beautifully restored in the mid-2000s, a parish hall renewed and expanded ten years ago, and a former rectory (Brooks Hall) that provides additional space for our ministries and other uses consistent with our mission. This property has been stewarded with care over many generations, and we benefit from the giving of those who came before us.

Remember the Future is a book by an Episcopal priest and diocesan staff member I knew in New York. It provides a guide to financial leadership and asset management for congregations, and challenges leaders to imagine and live toward a future filled with growth and hope. At its retreat earlier this year,

your vestry started an intentional process of planning to support such a future by considering the state of our facilities and the demographics of our parish and denomination. Happily we are not in a position of needing to build more square footage, but we do need to care for our property in a way that is financially responsible over the long term. Happily our pledging showed a strong increase for this year, but a large percentage of our stewardship comes from those "of riper years," and membership numbers have been trending downward in the Episcopal Church for decades.

As it considers how to meet these challenges, the Vestry has authorized an exploratory steering committee with this charge: Through research, conversation, and discernment to develop a recommendation to the vestry on the advisability and structure of a capital campaign. (Our last capital campaign was over ten years ago.) The exploratory steering committee is chaired by Jay Fisher and the other members are Joel Cunningham, Julie Elrod, Rob Lamborn (*ex officio*), Barbara Prunty, Annette Smith, and Beth Wiley. It has been gathering information, and holding conversations with fundraising consultants and experts who evaluate facilities to determine major maintenance and repair needs.

In parallel, at the Vestry's request a Brooks Study Committee is evaluating Brooks Hall. It is chaired by Annette Smith and consists of Meg Beasley, Betty Barton Blythe, Susan Holmes, Diane Jones (Jr. Warden, ex officio) Rob Lamborn (Rector, ex officio), Linda Lankewicz, Ned Murray, Julian Price, Lane Price, and Doug Seiters. This group brings a variety of helpful experiences and skills to its work. Currently the Brooks Study Committee is collecting the history of Brooks Hall, analyzing how it is currently used and how it might be used in the future to support our ministries. and what is needed to bring it to a state of good repair.

Remembering the future is a lot of work! I am grateful to the individuals who have begun devoting their time and energies to this important task, and look forward to their reports to the Vestry. I ask your prayers for discernment as the process unfolds.



Ever wondered about Brooks Hall?

The Otey Parish rectory (now Brooks Hall) was built in 1907 during the rectorship of William Sterling Claiborne. According to Arthur Ben Chitty's parish history pamphlet, it was funded by a friend in Philadelphia who wanted Mrs. Claiborne to live in "a real house." The building housed the rector and his family until 1999 (partway into the rectorate of Tom Macfie). It was then rented as a residence over the next few years. During the mid-2000s campaign to restore the church and rectory, Louis Rice made the lead gift for work on the rectory and its renaming as Brooks Hall in

honor of Louis's late wife's family. Since then, Brooks has provided meeting, office, educational, and social space.

Brooks currently houses the offices of the Deacon and of the Organist/Choir Director and Children's Choir Director, as well as the Youth Room. Seminarian Bahley Minor rents part of the upstairs as a residence, and another room is rented by two psychotherapists, each one day per week. A caregiver support group meets in Brooks weekly, the Advent Bible Study and Vacation Bible School have also made use of it, and other meetings take place there. The double parlor, dining room, and front hall are a good location for occasional receptions, dinners, etc. (some of which generate revenue). The land Brooks sits on is also used for a number of parish activities, such as the parish picnic, Vacation Bible School, and parking.

Vestry Highlights

Retreat on 1/27/24

--Worshiped with morning and noonday prayers

--Introduced themselves more fully with reference to what brought them to the parish

--Reviewed the responsibilities of vestry service and the processes of deliberation and decision-making

--Heard from the Rector Rob Lamborn about the decades-long downward numerical trend in the Episcopal Church, and from Treasurer Beth Wiley about the age categories of our pledgers.

--Heard from Junior Warden Diane Jones about upcoming major maintenance and repair needs, including replacement of HVAC units as they fail, re-roofing as needed, building exteriors, and landscaping.

--Discussed ideas for improving evangelism ministry and for the possibility of establishing a major maintenance fund and an endowment.

--Received with gratitude the news that the Thurmond Library has contributed \$5000 to the parish toward HVAC repair/replacement.

Regular meeting of 2/15/24

--Met in the church to hear a recommendation from the Organist/Choir Director and Rector to relocate the organ console to the rear of the church. --Authorized up to \$3000 for the project.

--Heard reports from CAC, Buildings and Grounds, and Parish Life in addition to the regular reports of the Treasurer and Rector.

Called meeting of 2/26/24

--Joined with the Rector in endorsing the recommendation of the Vocational Discernment Committee (Robin Bates, John Gatta, Janet Graham, Jennifer Michael, Wyatt Prunty, Harriet Runkle, and Lenda Sherrell) that Michael Thompson continue to the diocesan level in the process toward ordination to the priesthood.

Why relocate the organ console?

St. Mark & St. Paul's current pipe organ originated in 1960, when Ed Camp was organist. It consisted of four ranks (sets of pipes with a particular sound) and the pipework was located in the transept to the congregation's left. In the 1980s the pipes were moved to the current rear gallery (constructed by Bill Mauzy), and an additional rank added. From this rear placement the pipes speak more



directly into the nave and support the congregation more strongly. Over the years, more ranks of pipes have been added, so that the organ currently has eleven. The additional ranks are primarily for the purpose of offering additional tone colors for the organist to use, not for more volume.

When the church was restored in the mid-





2000s, it reverted from carpet to wood floors, improving the acoustical environment. At that time the organ console was moved to its current location in the transept. Two factors have led Ken Miller and Rob Lamborn to recommend moving the console to the back of the church. The organ sounds very different (and **much** softer) from the location of the organ console than it does in the nave where the congregation sits. Our revived adult choir is singing best from underneath the organ gallery, and it would be best for them to be able to be conducted from the organ console nearby. Moving the console has the additional benefit of allowing us to move the grand piano into the transept, improving traffic flow around the altar. One pew will need to be moved from the back of the church to along the front right wall.



The Diocesan Convention that was previously scheduled for January 19-20 at St. Paul's, Murfreesboro and postponed due to winter weather was held on February 10. Lay delegates Lynn Stubblefield and Michael Thompson, join clergy Betty Carpenter and Rob Lamborn in representing St. Mark & St. Paul.




Wednesday Nights in Lent Lenten Soup Series Green Gospel: Foundations of Ecotheology by John Gatta Continues through-Mar20 in Claiborne Hall, 5:30-7:00pm

Join us Wednesday evenings for our Lenten Soup Series. A simple meal of soup and bread will be served at 5:30, with the study beginning at 6:00. The meals will be prepared and served by various church committees. We are reading Dr. John Gatta's new book Green Gospel: Foundations of Ecotheology, with the author facilitating discussion. Green Gospel opens a window into the

developing realm of ecotheology, defining foundational principles and outlining how these tenets can be lived out through worship and individual practice. To help readers connect with otherwise challenging concepts, Gatta's Green Gospel draws on illustrative examples from literary works and liturgical texts to transport readers through these artistic portals to a world lit up by God's grace. John Gatta is Emeritus Professor of English at the University of Connecticut, Storrs and at the University of the South, where he served as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. He has also taught at the University of Missouri, as a Fullbright lecturer in Senegal, and in South Africa. He is the author of seven books and more than 50 academic articles, having devoted his research to two

specific areas: pre-1900 American literary and cultural history, and theological topics including the interplay between religious faith and literary imagination. The final session will be on March 20 at which time we will discuss Chapter 6.

Centering Prayer

Centering Prayer is a method of silent prayer through which we consent to God's presence and action within us. Those who practice it do so not in place of corporate worship and service, but rather as a necessary complement to those modes of engaging with God and with neighbor. Having a core of people in the parish who practice contemplative prayer makes a difference.

The Centering Prayer support group at St. Mark and St. Paul's continues to meet faithfully every Monday night. With chairs encircling a candle at the front of the nave, we have a brief check-in about our prayer practice and anything else going on in our lives, and then we have a meditation session (what we call a "sit") together. Over the past year we have averaged 5-7 attendees. Two of our longterm members have moved nearer to family, but since adding an announcement in the weekly bulletin, we have gained two people, one new and

one who had been part of our group in the past. We hope to host a half-day workshop at the parish sometime in the coming year.


Education for Ministry

The EfM seminar meets on Monday nights from 6:30 until 9:00 in the Hethcock Room. We are a vivacious group of nine (seven women and two men) covering all 4 years of the EfM program: Year 1 studies the Hebrew Bible, Year 2 studies the New Testament, Year 3 studies the History of Christianity, and Year 4 studies contemporary theology of the Episcopal tradition. Participants from all four years reflect upon various concerns from their readings, the relationship of those themes between each of the four years, and the implications of the theme in today's world. We reflect on these themes through four different perspectives- experience, society (culture), tradition (Episcopal Church), and personal beliefs. The goal of EfM is to deepen faith and to discover expressions of that faith in service to others. EfM will open for new students in Fall, 2024.

The Community Action Committee was a recipient of a Capacity Building Grant through the Office of Civic Engagement at The University of the South. This grant allowed CAC to purchase a new refrigerator and organization bins for the food pantry!

The addition of the fridge in the food pantry allows CAC to store more perishable goods, and simplify the shopping experience for both CAC neighbors and volunteers. We are so thankful for our Canale Intern's work on this grant to make this possible for CAC!



Another partnership of CAC is with the Sewanee Sportsmans Club at The University of the South. Through this partnership, the Sportsmans Club covers the cost for a deer to be processed and then donated to CAC for our neighbors. We are thrilled to have this partnership with the student organization to make more protein items available in the food pantry.





About once a month, CAC purchases food from the Second Harvest Food Bank of Middle Tennessee. A monthly order contains about 2,000 pounds of food primarily consisting of nonperishable food items to stock our pantry shelves.

CAC received its monthly restock on February 22nd. And with the help of students from St. Andrews -Sewanee, all the shelves were stocked within minutes. Big thanks to SAS for always helping out CAC during Winterim!

If you are interested in helping unload orders for CAC, we would greatly appreciate some extra hands. The order is usually delivered on the third or fourth Thursday of each month around 11:30 AM.

Greetings from your Altar Guild.

We wish to extend a warm welcome to our new parish members and a continued "thank you" to those who have been around a while. The Altar Guild ministry is open to everyone – including men, as you may have noticed in the weekly bulletin listing those serving each Sunday. Some families

like to get involved and that is certainly encouraged. We like to utilize everyone's particular skills. Some like to polish brass/silver while some like to wash linens for the Eucharist. I personally like the satisfaction of seeing the altar setup for the service – everything in its place and ready for the ministers to use during the service.

Like everything else, altar guild service is not for everyone. We welcome you to try it out for a month or two to see if it is as fulfilling for you as it is for those of us currently serving. We promise we will be there to walk you through everything and we utilize checklists, post photographs or diagrams of altar setups and provide manuals to help us all remember what to do.

What type of time commitment is involved? For our regular services we schedule 2 members a Sunday. They usually meet on Sat. morning to polish and get the vessels setup for Sunday. On Sunday morning, one person comes prior to the 8:30am service (around 8:00am) and sets out the prepared items. After that service both members clean what was used and resets for the 11:00am service. After that service the second member cleans and puts everything away. Of course there are special services such as funerals or seasonal services where we all pitch in according to our availability.


